### Christians call the day

Key Vocabulary			
<b>Creation</b>	When the universe and everything in it was made by God.	<b>Death</b>	The end or ending of life.
<b>Fall</b>	When Adam and Eve disobeyed God in the Garden of Eden.	<b>Crucifixion</b>	Jesus was nailed by his feet and hands to a cross and killed.
<b>Maundy Thursday</b>	The last day of freedom Jesus had before he was arrested. Jesus washed his disciples feet and ate the Last Supper with them.	<b>Resurrection</b>	Jesus brought back to life by God after he had died.
<b>Last Supper</b>	The final meal that Jesus shared with his disciples in Jerusalem before his crucifixion.	<b>Ritual</b>	A ceremony or series of acts that is always performed the same way.
<b>Holy Communion</b>	Holy Communion is the most important religious service in the Christian church, people share bread and wine as a symbol of the Last Supper and the death of Christ.	<b>Betrayal</b>	When a person breaks the trust and faith of others that trust them.
<b>Passover</b>	A celebration of the freedom of the Jews from slavery in ancient Egypt.	<b>Trust</b>	A person or thing in which confidence is placed.

### Key Learning

- Christians see Holy Week as the culmination of Jesus' earthly life, leading to his death and resurrection.
- The various events of Holy Week, such as the Last Supper, were important in showing the disciples what Jesus came to do.
- Christians today trust that Jesus really did rise from the dead, and so is still alive today.
- Christians remember and celebrate Jesus' last week, death and resurrection.
