

Maundy Thursday	The last day of freedom Jesus had before he was arrested. Jesus washed his disciples feet and ate the Last Supper with them.	Resurrection	Jesus brought back to life by God after he had died.
Last Supper	The final meal that Jesus shared with his disciples in Jerusalem before his crucifixion.	Ritual	A ceremony or series of acts that is always performed the same way.
Holy Communion	Holy Communion is the most important religious service in the Christian church, people share bread and wine as a symbol of the Last Supper and the death of Christ.	Betrayal	When a person breaks the trust and faith of others that trust them.
Passover	A celebration of the freedom of the Jews from slavery in ancient Egypt.	Trust	A person or thing in which confidence is placed.
